

REGULAR MEETING OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF KENILWORTH HELD ON WEDNESDAY EVENING, MAY 8, 2019. MAYOR ANTHONY DELUCA PRESIDED.

Mayor Deluca read the requirements of the Open Public Meetings Act.

The Salute to the Flag was led by Mayor Deluca.

ROLL CALL

MINUTES

It was moved by Councilman Clementi, seconded by Councilman Schielke and carried that the above communications be received and filed and any money amounts indicated be spread over the minutes. All in favor.

MAYORS REPORT

The Union County Board of Elections is rolling out new voting machines. Kenilworth will be using these machines for the June Primary, demonstrations for these new machines will be held at the Union County Courthouse, Elizabeth, NJ on Tuesdays from 11AM to 3PM and at the Coleen Frazier Building in Westfield, NJ on Saturdays from 9AM to 1PM. The Mayor asked everyone to get educated on these machines, he heard that they are fairly easy and that there will be people at the polling places to help you. Mayor Deluca, Councilwomen Ceceri and Karlovitch had the honor today of attending the Italian/American War Veterans White Table Dedication. He said it was a solemn but very nice ceremony. He thanked the Italian/American War Veterans for inviting him and the Rotary for hosting the event and also Rinaldi’s restaurant.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Councilwoman Karlovitch reported that tonight is the public hearing and adoption of the 2019 Municipal Budget. The approved 2019 Capital Budget Plan has been sent to Bond Counsel for the purposes of

creating a Capital Bond Ordinance. The ordinance is tentatively scheduled for introduction at the May 22, 2019 meeting and the second reading and public hearing is June 26, 2019. Over the last several years the State has been late in adopting a budget, without the adoption of the budget a Certification of State Aid, the Tax Collector has recommended mailing out estimated tax bills. A resolution will be prepared for our next meeting to permit the release of estimated bills and the timely mailing to residents and property owners in July. Council Karlovitch said, as an update, she continues to be concerned with reports of excessive noise including horn blowing emulating from truck traffic. This noise occurs in the morning hours after midnight. She has conferred with the Borough Attorney and a notice will be forwarded to the business where we believe the excess noise is coming from to seize and Desist or face penalties.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Councilman David reported the DPW crew is collecting grass on a weekly basis and they are continuing to collect brush twice per month and they are also cutting grass at all the parks. On June 1, 2019 the DPW yard will be open from 8AM to 12PM for recyclables.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Councilman Clementi reported he has the Police Report for April and there were 2034 calls for service and 197 9/11 calls. On April 25th the Easter Egg Hunt was at DiMario Park without incident. The Kenilworth Police Department participated in Merck's Annual Take Your Child to Work Day at their world headquarters in Kenilworth. On April 30th LEAD which stands for Law Enforcement Against Drugs had their graduation ceremony both at St. Theresa's and Harding Schools. The Chief would like residents to take notice that on Sunday, May 19th from approximately 7AM to 7PM Kenilworth Boulevard will be closed to all traffic between North 14th Street and 23rd Street due to the Annual Street Fair. Residents and businesses should make arrangements to avoid any disruption in the traffic plans on that date. Chief Zimmerman thanks everyone for their anticipated cooperation.

DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING, ZONING & ORDINANCES

Councilman Schielke said he received some emails over the past months from residents on Commonwealth Avenue regarding sump pumps discharging into the street and said we have been working on this for quite a while. The Governing Body budgeted \$65,000 for repairs to correct this issue. The budget should be passed and funded by the end of June and this is in the capital section of the budget. The engineer has begun his design phase of two options, the first one is that we can run a pipe into Cranford, which requires Cranford's approval, and that would be a few dollars less and the other plan is to run a pipe into a sewer on Park Drive. He said both of those are viable options and one will be done. The engineer estimates that the design, bid process and construction will be completed by the fall. At the last meeting there were two zoning ordinances that were introduced, one is a requirement of a fence around construction sites if there is an open foundation or an open pit, the second is sump pump ordinance which disallowing any sort of construction below the water line so we don't have sump pumps discharging on a 24/7 basis. Both of those ordinances will have their final reading at our next meeting. Tomorrow night the Planning Board meets and we have a few resolutions on the agenda.

Mayor Deluca said Joe Deiorio and the girls in the Tax Office and Supplee Clooney work very hard and work very hard on the budget. He said we have colorful pictures that will explain in detail what the budget is and if you have any questions call Borough Hall.

Mayor Deluca said June 7, 1780 was the Battle of Connecticut Farms. One of our residents, Dorothea Krihak did a very extensive search into getting Kenilworth recognition for being part of that battle. Part of Kenilworth's history is that what was formerly Tin Kettle Hill was part of an observation point for George Washington when the Hessians continued into the Connecticut Farms area of Union. They also used it as a signal beacon to alert the militia to come to arms. Tin Kettle hill was across the street from Jefferson Avenue to 23rd Street and it was one of the highest points in this area and that is why they used it as an observation point.

PROCLAMATION

Battle of Connecticut Farms – June 7, 1780

WHEREAS, the Borough of Kenilworth, County of Union State of New Jersey, on this 8th day of May in the year 2019 hereby proclaims that our Borough was part of Connecticut Farms during the Battle of Connecticut Farms on June 7, 1780, in the course of the American Revolutionary War 1775 - 1783; and

WHEREAS, the Borough wishes to honor our citizen hero militia who fought in this major battle against the British Crown; protecting General George Washington and our American Continental Army who were encamped at Morristown, New Jersey at that date by stopping the surprise attack of five thousand British soldiers on route through Connecticut Farms, with the intent of marching to end the war with a British victory at Morristown; and

WHEREAS, General George Washington himself praised the militia at the Connecticut Farms Battle that took place that day on June 7, 1780, stating that the militia fought “with honor”.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Borough of Kenilworth hereby proclaims that moving forward every year, June 7th will be a day of remembrance and recognition of the hero militia here at Connecticut Farms that helped to win our independence from British rule to become the United States of America, fighting the Battle at Connecticut Farms, New Jersey during the American Revolutionary War.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in recognition and remembrance, from this day forward, Borough flags be flown at half-staff every June 7th.

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

Motion was made by Councilman Clementi, seconded by Councilwoman Ceceri to open the meeting to the public. All in favor.

Mr. Walter Sosnosky, 36 South 17th Street – Mr. Sosnosky said at the last meeting the term Czar was used to describe Chief Zimmerman and Mr. Sosnosky read the definition of Czar and said it was not name calling. He said there is a blackout again on crimes committed in the Borough, we were good for a while. He said there were 34 incidents of criminal activity in the Borough last month and not one was reported to the newspaper. He said it's not right.

Chief Zimmerman, Kenilworth Police Chief – Chief Zimmerman said he respects Mr. Sosnosky's opinion in the petition that was given to the town and for the Mayor and Council taking a look at it, he respectfully disagrees with your 34 instances of criminal activity that have occurred in Kenilworth. There have been instances that have occurred but not of criminal activity. The Chief said manpower is assigned where needed in the Police Department and as the Czar, patrol, detective bureau and school safety are his priorities for the Kenilworth Police Department. He said they do a walking beat every day as part of parking but that is with conditions permitting and it is not a priority. Lastly, what the Borough releases to the papers like Local Source, NJ 12...media outlets and we do put stuff on face book but we do not have any control over the media and what they decide to print, we release the information and they decide what they want to print. We give it to the Star Ledger sometimes which is NJ 12, we give it to the Local Source and we give it to the Kenilworth paper that goes out once a month and Renna Media, they don't print it, we have no say to make them print, they decide what they want to print. He said we do put it out there on Face Book and it is released to the papers.

Mr. Sosnosky challenges what Chief Zimmerman says. Mayor Deluca reminded Mr. Sosnosky to only address Chief Zimmerman's comments. Mr. Sosnosky said 6 or 7 months ago and he asked the Chief why all the communities are on the police blotter and never Kenilworth and the Chief said "That's not

my responsibility to give that information to the press” , and a week later crimes were in the paper and now they are not in the paper. He said he doesn’t believe the Chief.
